NOMENCLATURAL NOTES

We are doing our best to keep abreast of the changes in the internationally recognized nomenclature, and to help us in this regard our primary reference has been the *RHS Plant Finder (2011 - 2012)*. We have always presumed a high level of sophistication in our readers and so have never bothered to explain conventional terms like genus, species (sp.), variety (v.), subspecies (ssp.), forma (f.), affinis (aff.) and cultivar (cv.). The breeding of trademarked plants, however, has introduced a potential redundancy into their naming. We give two examples, as they appear in our catalogue, to illustrate a couple of points: **Heuchera Crème Brûlé** ['Tnheu041'] and **Echinacea Orange Meadowbrite** ['Art's Pride']. In the first example **Crème Brûlé** is the trademarked name and the cultivar name appears in square brackets and is enclosed in the conventional single quotes. In this case it is unlikely that anyone will come into the nursery asking for this plant by its cultivar name but we have included it for completeness of information. In the second example, both the trademarked name, **Orange Meadowbrite**, and the cultivar name, 'Art's Pride' are used with roughly equal frequency in the horticultural trade. As a consequence it has become imperative for us to print both names, arbitrarily assigning one a lower status as indicated by the square brackets.

Square brackets have also been used to convey supplemental information to the name. It may indicate the geographical source as with [Amur River Basin], the parentage such as [dumosus hybrid] or it may acknowledge the donor like [John's]. It may be descriptive with respect to the form ([Std.] for example refers to a Standard form), it could provide a synonymous or obsolete name, [Cimicifuga] being an example or it may be a literal translation for a plant originally named in another language, most frequently German, French, Japanese or Chinese as in [Bronze Elegance].

SOME HISTORY

Lost Horizons started out as a garden design and construction company several years ago, but we soon ran into trouble finding the perennials we wanted to use in our landscapes. One thing led to another, and we began sowing seeds and dividing plants. We are continually searching for and trying new plants; indeed, it sometimes seems an obsession (is there a need for Seedaholics Anonymous?).

The plants offered by Lost Horizons range from old cottage garden favourites to delicate alpines. A few horticultural thugs are listed — unmasked — but even they serve as useful groundcovers in restricted situations. The range of difficulty runs from easy to difficult (but not impossible). Gardeners tend to move from easier plants to ever-increasing challenges. Gardening can certainly be an intellectual as well as a physical challenge. There may be temporary setbacks, but they double our resolve to try again — in a different spot, in different soil. All of this brings to mind the saying “Been there, killed that”! Joseph Haldas takes the view that it wasn’t the plant, which caused difficulty, but rather the ability of the gardener. Plants come and go; some overstep their boundaries, some completely surprise us. Of all features of a garden, foliage is one of the most significant; the interplay of sizes, forms, textures, and colours creates much of the magic while flowers bloom and fade, providing fleeting highlights to this background. Perhaps the best thing about gardening is that it is an ever-changing, never-ending process.

Lost Horizons has extensive gardens, which are open for visiting. We welcome you to take this opportunity for viewing established examples of new and unusual varieties. You are also free to wander through the trial beds in order to see the most recent, developing plants.

A note about the name.... “Lost Horizons” is derived from the Frank Capra film, which held me spellbound as a child. Everything thrived in that luxuriant paradise hidden high in the mountains, far from the stress of the world. We hope that, with the assistance of Lost Horizons, you can create your own Shangri-la. We love to find new plants, we love to grow plants, we love to propagate plants, we love to sell plants. Almost everything is now container grown. We are using a coarse, heavy mix to grow in; our experience is that it produces a coarser root system and therefore develops a better plant for transplanting. In a peat mix, one ends up with a solid block of very fine roots. This can lead to problems, especially if the plant is placed in a clay soil; the roots tend to drown or to dry into an impervious lump. We guarantee our plants to be true to name and to leave here in good condition. If you have a problem shortly after picking up your plants we are willing to discuss it but it is your responsibility to provide the conditions they require. Even drought tolerant plants need adequate moisture until they are established.

AVAILABILITY

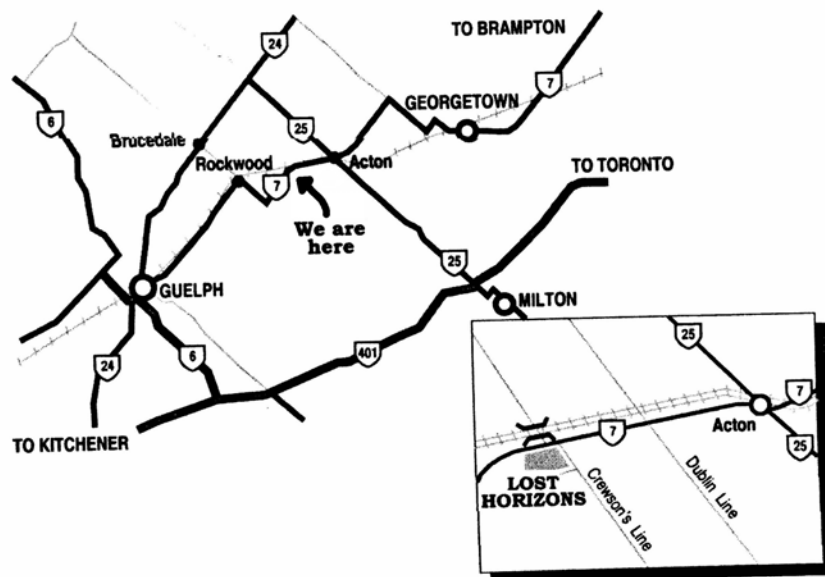
We cannot guarantee to have all of the plants listed at all times. We are not a huge operation, and many of these plants are in short supply. We have no control over losses due to weather conditions. We will not substitute plants unless you indicate on the order form that you would like us to do so. If you are looking for a certain plant, please let us know. We have many other plants in too small numbers to list. Plant sizes: The first set of numbers is the mature height; the second set indicates the mature width. Prices at the nursery may vary from prices in the catalogue, since the plants may be of different sizes. If you want catalogue prices, please put in an order. Any order not picked up will be charged 25%. It takes a lot of time and effort to process and pull the order.

RECYCLE

We hate spending money buying pots when so many are languishing in people's garages and in landfill sites. Please continue to return our pots, along with any others, but **only** in the sizes that we use. (i.e. 11 cm., 15 cm. and 1 gal.) It is greatly appreciated. We do **not** want annual cell packs or hanging baskets. It is also helpful if you bring trays or boxes to carry home your purchases in.

NOTE ON HARDINESS

I find it frustrating that the same plants are often listed in different reference materials with a wide range of hardiness zones. When asking around in the trade, I've found that most hardiness levels seem to be assigned essentially on hearsay, with little scientific evaluation. In this catalogue, many plants are listed as Zone 5 because we are able to grow them here, but a good number of them are probably much hardier than listed.

Many factors influence hardiness. One of the most important is snow cover. Because snow (especially dry snow) traps so much air, it is an excellent insulator.

A friend who gardens considerably north of here grows things with which I've had difficulty, because he has deep, reliable snow cover, while here the winter snow is anything but reliable. Quite often it is the recurrent early spring thaws that leave a plant exposed and weakened. Once established, plants seem to be hardier, but mulching around them will aid in protecting the roots from this rollercoaster ride. Mulch placed in fall can help catch snow, providing more insulation. It also has year-round benefits: water retention, weed control, and protection from the baking sun. Another factor in plant

survival is soil moisture. Some plants, especially those from intercontinental areas, survive much better in well-drained soils where excess moisture can drain away. Similarly, we have found many bog plants will grow in very moist to wet soils but don't survive being frozen to -20 degree C. The same plants often survive fine in a drier winter soil. So don't be put off by the zone listings in this catalogue; they are only very general guidelines. If you grow any of these plants in lower hardiness zones, we would be happy to hear from you so that we may provide more accurate information. Thanks.

UNDERSTANDING THE CATALOGUE

The number after the description is the size of pot that the plant comes in. In the bottom line – the first is the plant family and second is where the plant originated. Then comes the zone hardiness number and the last numbers are the height x the width of the plant at maturity in the garden.

Acanthus

Acanthus 'Morning Candle' \$18.00

A free flowering selection from Holland's New Generation plants. It is a hybrid between *A. mollis* and *A. hungaricus* or *spinosa*. The numerous four foot flower spikes are filled with white flowers with purple hoods. The deeply scalloped leaves are deer resistant. It has proved very hardy here. [Acanthaceae] [Garden origin] [z5] [Full sun] [1 gal] [1.2 m (4') / 1 m (3')]

Acanthus hungaricus [A. balcanicus] \$18.00

Bears' Breeches. The huge, 30" long leaves are deeply lobed and have prominent mid-ribs. White or pale pink flowers with purple-shaded bracts are borne in racemes 24-28" long in early to mid-summer. This has been a very hardy and long-lived plant in the garden, here. It thrives in shallow soils where a lot of other plants would perish. [Acanthaceae] [Caucasus] [z5] [Full sun] [1 gal] [1 m (3') / 1 m (3')]

Acanthus spinosus \$18.00

Very attractive, deeply lobed, spiny-looking foliage. Flowers are a clear white with striking purple bracts. Said to be the hardiest of the Bears' Breeches. An elegant specimen for well-drained soils with protection from winter wet. Reliably hardy. [Acanthaceae] [Europe] [z5] [Full sun to part sun] [1 gal] [1.5 m (5') / 90 cm (3')]

Achillea

Achillea 'Moonshine' \$10.00

A plant we have not sold for awhile but decided it was worth putting back in the catalogue. From a clump of ferny grey foliage come flat umbels of soft yellow, long lasting blooms. [Asteraceae] [Eurasia] [z5] [Full sun] [1 gal] [30-40 cm (12-16") / 25 cm (10")]

Achillea millefolium 'Sunny Seduction' \$12.00

An improvement over *A. Moonshine*' with a compact habit and superior branching and broad panicles of bright lemony flowers that bloom for most of the summer. Attractive to butterflies and long lasting as a cut flower. [Asteraceae] [Eurasia] [z4] [Full sun] [1 gal] [45 cm (16") / 60 cm (2')]

Achillea sibirica Love Parade \$10.00

A distinctive achillea that has long serrated shiny leaves. The umbels of light pink daisies that slowly fade to white. A very hardy, drought tolerant and low maintenance selection. [Asteraceae] [Russia] [z5] [Full sun] [1 gal] [60 cm (24") / 40 cm (16")]

Achillea tomentosa var. aurea \$10.00

Woolly yarrow is a tough, hardy compact plant tolerant of drought and poor soils. It develops into a low mat of fine, hairy, ferny silver foliage. An easy plant for the rock garden or front of the sunny border. Corymbs of yellow blooms in early summer. [Asteraceae] [Europe] [z5] [Full sun] [1 gal] [20-30 cm (8-12") / 30 cm (12")]

Aconitum

Aconitum 'Blue Lagoon' \$10.00

Bright blue monkshood blooms on compact [1'] plants that provide late season bloom and fit in the smallest of gardens. It is unique in that it starts blooming from the bottom up. Highly disease and pest resistant. [Ranunculaceae] [Europe] [z4] [Part sun to shade] [1 gal] [30 cm (12") / 30 cm (12")]

Aconitum 'Bressingham Spire' \$10.00

A compact Monkshood that, at just over two feet, doesn't need any staking. Dense spikes of dark, violet blue hoods. [Ranunculaceae] [Europe] [z3] [Part sun to shade] [1 gal] [65 cm (26") / 30 cm (12")]

Aconitum 'Burgfurst' \$10.00

A worthwhile selection of medium height and racemes of rich blue blooms. [Ranunculaceae] [Europe] [z5] [Part sun to shade] [1 gal] [1-1.8 m (3-6') / 60 cm (2')]

Aconitum 'Cloudy' \$10.00

A useful, medium-sized selection of Monkshood. Large, white 'hoods' with blue shading. Shiny, cut foliage. Stands up. Late blooming. [Ranunculaceae] [North Temperate Zone] [z5] [Part sun to shade] [1 gal] [60 cm (2') / 40 cm (16")]

Aconitum 'Eleonora' \$11.00

A lovely selection with white helmets tinged with blue. A wonderful addition to the open woodland garden. [Ranunculaceae] [Garden origin] [z4] [Part sun to shade] [1 gal] [2 m (6') / 45 cm (18")]

Aconitum 'Ivoryine' \$10.00

Wonderful mounds of foliage in June. Earliest of the monkshoods to bloom, with many stems of creamy-white flowers. Full sun to part shade in any soil. Will delightfully seed about. [Ranunculaceae] [Europe] [z4] [Part sun to shade] [1 gal] [45 cm (18") / 45 cm (18")]

Aconitum 'Mauve Giant' \$13.00

A stunner that appeared in the stock beds that is by far the tallest monkshood we have seen. The strong towering stems topped by clusters of mauve helmets. [Ranunculaceae] [Garden origin] [] [Full sun to part sun] [1 gal] [240-300 cm (8-10') / 60 cm (2')]

Aconitum albobviolaceum \$15.00

A rare and interesting climbing monkshood from China. The hairy hooded blooms like small smurf hats are white blushed with pink or mauve. [Ranunculaceae] [China] [z5] [Part sun to shade] [1 gal] [2 m (6')]

Aconitum anthorideum \$10.00

A compact Monkshood collected in the Russian Altai in a mountain meadow. Racemes of 5-20 light yellow flowers. [Ranunculaceae] [Russia] [z5] [Full sun to part sun] [1 gal] [20-30 cm (8-12") / 20 cm (8")]

Aconitum apoiense 'Album' \$16.00

A rare species with white flowers. [Ranunculaceae] [] [z5] [Part sun to shade] [1 gal] []

Aconitum arcuatum \$11.00

A charming species from Korea with dark, scandent stems with heads of dark blue, hooded flowers. Tolerant of dry shade. [Ranunculaceae] [Asia] [z5] [Full shade] [1 gal] [1.5 m (5')]

Aconitum ferox \$14.00

This aconite comes from the Himalayas and is used as a homeopathic remedy. Spikes of striking blue hairy blooms with black centres are appealing over lacy foliage. [Ranunculaceae] [Himalayas] [z5] [Part sun to shade] [1 gal] [1 m (3') / 40 cm (16")]

Aconitum fischeri \$10.00

An excellent monkshood with shiny cut leaf foliage on stems that are tough and upright and never need staking. Clear violet blue hooded blooms in late summer. [Ranunculaceae] [China] [z3] [Part sun to shade] [1 gal] [90 cm (36") / 60-75 cm (24-30")]

Aconitum gmeunii \$10.00

Aconitum hemsleyanum \$18.00

A climbing monkshood that does have tendrils to help its vigorous climb to ten feet. Good deeply cut foliage and large late season hanging clusters of violet purple blooms. Great growing through spring flowering shrubs or a small tree or on an arbour.[Ranunculaceae] [China] [z4] [Part sun to shade] [1 gal] [2 m (7') / 35 cm (14'')]

Aconitum incisofidum \$10.00

A rare larger monkshood from fir forests in the hills of Yunnan. The violet blue hoods appear late summer. A plant we received from Seneca Hills. A vigorous grower with upright stems.[Ranunculaceae] [China] [z5] [Part sun to shade] [1 gal] [1.3 m (52") / 60 cm (2')]

Aconitum jaluense \$10.00

A midsize, rare species from forest margins of the far east.[Ranunculaceae] [Asia] [z4] [1 gal] [45-90 cm (18-36") / 20 cm (8'')]

Aconitum japonicum \$10.00

This summer-blooming species' flowers are blue-purple or somewhat tinged red.[Ranunculaceae] [Japan] [z5] [Part sun to shade] [1 gal] [75 cm (30") / 40 cm (16'')]

Aconitum kusnezoffii \$11.00

A blue hooded, Asian species that is shorter. Will grow in clay soils. Used in Chinese medicine.[Ranunculaceae] [China, Russia] [z4] [1 gal] [60 cm (2') / 40 cm (16'')]

Aconitum lycoctonium 'Moldavicum' \$10.00

A European species with mauve to purple blooms.[Ranunculaceae] [Europe] [z5] [Full sun to part sun] [1 gal] []

Aconitum lycoctonium \$10.00

Erect Monkshood that has long thin spikes of soft, pale yellow flowers.[Ranunculaceae] [Europe] [z4] [Part sun to shade] [1 gal] [1.2 m (4') / 45 cm (18'')]

Aconitum napiforme \$10.00

A late blooming monkshood with a shrubby appearance and dense terminal racemes of blue flowers.[Ranunculaceae] [] [] [11 cm / 4'] [1.2-1.8 m (4-6') / 90 cm (3')]

Aconitum seoulense \$10.00

A species from Korea where it grows in mountain meadows and open spots in the woods. The showy ink blue flowers are produced in loose sprays on strong upright stems. Late summer bloomer. Compact.[Ranunculaceae] [Korea] [z5] [Part sun to shade] [1 gal] [100cm[36"] 45cm[18'']]

Aconitum sp \$10.00

[] [Garden origin] [z5] [Part sun to shade] [1 gal] []

Aconitum trilobum \$10.00

A Korean species with attractive cut foliage and dense heads of blue flowers.[Ranunculaceae] [Korea] [z4] [Part sun to shade] [1 gal] []

Aconitum uncinatum \$16.00

A scrambling or twining species that looks great tumbling over walls, rocks or shrubs. Large hoods of purple-blue with dark green, palmately divided, toothed foliage.[Ranunculaceae] [Eastern North America] [z4] [Full sun to part sun] [1 gal] [1.2 m (4')]

Actaea**Actaea asiatica** \$12.00

This Asian counterpart to our native Baneberry is an aristocratic choice for the woodland garden. Airy, white flowers are followed by showy black berries on pink tinged stalks, giving it a long season of interest. The foliage holds up well throughout the season.[Ranunculaceae] [Asia] [z4] [Part sun to shade] [1 gal] [70 cm (28") / 40 cm (16'')]

Actaea japonica 'Snow Flurry' \$19.00

Our own introduction that we discovered and finally divided a few plants after Bill kept asking for it for years. A diminutive bugbane, liberally splashed with cream.[Ranunculaceae] [Japan] [z5] [Part sun to shade] [1 gal] [40-50cm (16-19") / 40-50cm (16-19'')]

Actaea japonica 'Cheju-do' \$12.00

An exciting new selection from Darrell Probst that is both compact and a prolific bloomer. In late summer a plant can produce a dozen or more spikes of white flowers. The leaves can emerge with a purple cast that turns to green. The foliage is only 30-35 cm.[Ranunculaceae] [Asia] [z4] [Part sun to shade] [1 gal] [1-1.2 m (3-4') / 25 cm (10'')]

Actaea pachypoda 'Misty Blue' \$18.00

One of the best new woodland plants to come out of the industry in a few years. It forms a clump of captivating, soft blue foliage, topped with bottle brush white flowers that are followed by white berries (doll's eyes) on striking purple to red stems. A long lasting, low maintenance, drought tolerant beauty. A Mount Cuba introduction.[Ranunculaceae] [North America] [z5] [Part sun to shade] [1 gal] [60-75cm (24-30") / 40-50cm (16-20'')]

Actaea pachypoda f. rubrocarpa \$10.00

Our native Baneberry with luminescent rose berries on maroon-coloured stalks provides a demure, understated presence in the woodland garden. Indestructible.[Ranunculaceae] [Eastern North America] [z3] [Part sun to shade] [1 gal] [90 cm (36") / 45 cm (18'')]

Actaea rubra f. neglecta [A. pachypoda] \$10.00

A woodland plant that doesn't get noticed until its gleaming white berries on red stems appear towards the end of the summer. Long lived once established and a tough native.[Ranunculaceae] [North America] [z4] [1 gal] [40 cm (16") / 35 cm (14'')]

Actaea simplex Atropurpurea Group 'James Compton' \$15.00

A shorter version of 'Brunette'. Dark black foliage develops after the first season. New foliage comes up green. White flowers from mid summer are very fragrant. Choice for the smaller partly shaded garden. Stuck on a desert island, I might make this my one choice.[Ranunculaceae] [Garden origin] [z3] [Part sun to shade] [1 gal] [80 cm (32") / 35 cm (14'')]

Actaea simplex Atropurpurea Group 'Hillside Black Beauty' \$24.00

We have found this to be one of the darkest selections in the garden. Forms a striking specimen of purplish-black, ferny foliage topped by fragrant, foot long, bottle brush flowers that open white with a pale pink tinge.[Ranunculaceae] [Mongolia] [z4] [Part sun to shade] [1 gal] [150 cm (5') / 60-70 cm (24-28'')]

Actaea spicata \$10.00

Black Baneberry is a European equivalent to our native but has small racemes of white flowers followed by black berries. It is not a showy plant but useful as a lacy foil in the woodland garden.[Ranunculaceae] [Europe] [z4] [Part sun to shade] [1 gal] [50cm[20"] 45cm[18'']]

Actaea yunnanensis \$16.00

A rare species from China with a single unbranched stem with a wand of starry creamy-yellow blooms with long stamens give an airy effect. Delightful foliage, almost astilbe like with a rosy cast to the edges of the leaves.[Ranunculaceae] [China] [z5] [Part sun to shade] [1 gal] [140 cm (5') / 90 cm (3')]

Actaea [Cimicifuga] cordifolia \$10.00

Epimedium 'Domino' \$34.00

Gentiana septemfida v. lagodechiana 'Select' **\$12.00**

Geranium

We also avoid some of the ones that tend to flop; if you have these, cutting them back to the ground can help. Geranium 'Azure Rush' **\$16.00**

If the leaf stalk breaks away from the rhizome, it leaves a distinctive scar said to resemble the official seal of King Solomon. Indians and colonists used the starchy rhizomes as food. A thrilling new import from Japan. It is a smaller species [1' tall] but is an easy and strong grower. The intense foliage ranges from being striped boldly in yellow to fully yellow leaves. A wonderful bright spot for any shade garden. The Japanese supplier didn't mention that after spring the brilliant leaves fade to chartreuse and green.[Convallariaceae] [Japan] [z4] [Part sun to shade] [1 gal] [30cm[12"] 40cm[15"]]

Polygonatum multiflorum \$10.00

A form given to us by Paul Ehnes that has extra flowers and black berries.[Convallariaceae] [Eastern North America] [z4] [Part sun to shade] [1 gal] [30-90 cm (12-36") / 60 cm (24")]

Polygonatum odoratum 'Chollipo' [red stem] \$20.00

Collected in the Taean Peninsula in Korea. The most striking attribute are the red stems. At Chelsea recently this was displayed as a fabulous new introduction not yet available. The thick green leaves and hanging bells complete the picture.[Convallariaceae] [Korea] [z5] [Part sun to shade] [1 gal] [45 cm (18") / 45 cm (18")]

Polygonatum odoratum 'Fireworks' \$28.00

A prostrate selection made between *V. armena* and *V. pectinata* that has inherited the best traits of both species. It is denser and more vigorous with tiny oak-like leaves. The mats are covered by masses of medium to deep blue-violet, cheery blooms in late April to mid May. It will tolerate light foot traffic. Very drought tolerant. Polypodium

Polypodium vulgare 'Bifidomultifidum' \$14.00
Crested Polypody Fern. An easy fern that has evergreen fronds are forked at the tips. The fronds are deeply cut and leathery. Hardy and drought tolerant and will slowly spread by rhizome to form a clump. [Polypodiaceae] [North Temperate Zone] [z5] [Part sun to shade] [1 gal] [30-40 cm (12-16") / 40 cm (16")]

Polystichum

Polystichum acrostichoides \$13.00
The Christmas Fern is a tough hardy native that is tolerant of deep shade. Polystichum setiferum 'Proliferum' \$15.00

Andropogon 'Indian Warrior' **\$15.00**

Andropogon 'Rain Dance' **\$15.00**

Deschampsia caespitosa 'Tautrager' ['Dew Carrier'] \$13.00
A shorter selection with light green slender inflorescences. [Poaceae] [Eurasia] [z5] [Full sun to part sun] [1 gal] [30-45 cm (12-18") / 30-35 cm (12-14")]

Eragrostis

Eragrostis spectabilis \$14.00
Bright purple, diffuse panicles up to 16" long. A clump former that is stunning in the fall. [Poaceae] [z5] [Full sun to part sun] [1 gal] [60 cm (2') / 45 cm (18")]

Festuca

Festuca amethystina \$12.00
A clump former that's a bit larger than the regular Fescue. Leaves are rolled and thread-like, creating a fine texture. June flowers are attractive and held well above the foliage. [Poaceae] [Europe] [z4] [Full sun] [1 gal] [60 cm (24") / 40 cm (16")]

Festuca brachyphylla \$10.00
